Certification Update- Cartaya

Eddy has been working with USFS/NPS to look at outside certification.

9:30 am PST

Andrew Hower joined to explain the National Emergency Response Database He showed the EMS Model, which has Education, Certification, Licensing, and Credentialing. This is a model that could potentially be used for Cave Rescue.

He helped develop the Incident Position Qualification Guide (IPQG), which has qualifications for many different positions. No cave rescue position currently exists.

The National Park Service is a logical place to do the Licensing. They are directed "The saving of human life will take precedence over all other management actions..." If NPS is requested to outside of their lands, they can.

Development of a Position Task Book for Cave Rescue (at three different levels, corresponding to finishing Levels 1, 2, and 3) is under development. Some of the requirements are: IS 100, 700

SR-Basic Search and Rescue

IAT: A100 (basic helicopter)

First Aid and CPR

Moderate Physical Fitness test (2 miles in \leq 30 minutes with a 25-pound pack Cave rescue knowledge

Once someone has checked off their Position Task Book, they could be put into the Interagency Resource Ordering Capability (IROC). During a SAR, the NPS could hire them as and Administratively Determined (AD) hire, which provides worker's comp.

There are still some questions pending on if the NCRC would need to continue to do Certification as recently developed or if prior check-offs would suffice. The physical fitness test would be administered by a federal agency or perhaps a grotto. Any individual with a desire to complete the Position Task Book would have to get in touch with a NPS unit, and it was talked about having several NPS units throughout the country take a lead in this effort.

Endowed Scholarship Report (continued): Reames

Overview

Now that it's been in place for a while, starting to spread word to any students who have recently taken a course that they can create an account using their NCRC ID (not their NSS ID) and email address. This allows them to review the information we have on them.

We continue to be plagued by missing data, especially from early courses. There's not much that can be done about this.

Last year was a light year in terms of students added/updated to the DB due to a real slowdown in training.

I've had an issue creating the report showing instructor status in a presentable format. The data is still available. However, due to extenuating circumstances (such as the extension granted to Puerto Rican instructors several years ago due to lack of testing/certification capabilities, and lack of opportunities last year) some instructors may show their status as expired, when all they need to do is contact the Training Coordinator and work out an extension/exception. If any of your local instructors mention they have not gotten the recent survey or feel left out, please have them let Roger and I know so we can look into it.

- -Revised SPAR lead instructor test. Added a more detailed description of safety margins for use while assessing potential lead instructors who are testing, and for more general use. This is not

the same as the NCRC Safety Policy but we feel it will be consistent with it. It will be revisited if there is a more general safety policy approved.

- -Rearranged L3 curricular schedule to fit in Management and L3 Search
- -Rearranged all schedules to fit in Belay certification testing on Day 2 evening so to disimpact certification testing on Thursday.

Plans

- -Revised LP for SPAR pick-offs is being balloted
- -Finish L3 Search and ballot and bring to BORC
- -Ballot L3 Management and bring to BORC
- -There is interest and expertise in doing a specialized class in cave modification. It was put on hold for COVID but could still happen.
- -On a big picture level we want to look at the progression of the curriculum over the three levels. Ideally knowledge and skills, codified as objectives, flow over the three levels with a progression of difficulty. While repetition is sometimes advisable, some of the lesson plans have too much. We are working on tracking all the objectives to see if we like the amount of overlap versus progression. We have also identified that certain objectives pertain to other domains and would benefit from re-emphasis (e.g. hypothermia and packaging).

We are proposing to redo our lesson plans based on a reanalysis of objectives. Pending BORC approval, objectives would be adjusted to reflect ideal progression.

The MIG was created as a public internet discussion group to debate and record contemporary medical recommendations as they pertain to the austere underground environment. The discussions actively continue and are used as guidance and perspective when developing new curriculum. The MIG is publicly available at: **groups.google.com/g/ncrc-mig**

Curriculum - The NCRC **Medical Matrix** was published and remains under active development. It serves as a roadmap to update the entire medical curriculum of the NCRC. Entirely new lectures (such as **L1 - Hypothermia** v200420) have been developed and **lesson plans** approved for all of L2 and L3 following the medical matrix. The medical Matrix may be reviewed at: **bit.ly/ncrc_medical_matrix**

Standard Operating Guidelines - A complete reorganization and reformatting of all current SOGs was completed (and published on **new letterhead**). In addition, two new SOGs (102. **NCRC**

Structure v200420 and 401. **BORC Procedures** v200427) were authored to codify and formalize our accepted procedures. The SOGs are available at: **bit.ly/ncrc_sogs**

COVID - The global pandemic introduced new obstacles previously unknown to the NCRC. Along with the Training Coordinator and dedicated Regional Coordinators, dynamic policy was developed (including **virtual lectures**) that allowed for safe delivery of NCRC curriculum.

Training

Due to COVID the National we were planning on hosting was moved to 2021 (see update on that in separate report).

By late summer, it became obvious there was still sufficient interest in further training, so with approval of the Training Coordinator, held the first ever Regional Level 1 in the Northeastern Region. This was held under strict Covid protocols and was done as a modular. Again, with approval, we used 2 separate Thursday night Zoom sessions to cover much of the classroom work. This allowed more time onsite to be in the field and to reduce close contact between students and instructors and staff. This worked well and I could consider it be considered for future modular. The sessions were recorded and are available on the website upon request.

This Modular allowed us to use the camp and surrounding facilities and I continue to be happy with them with a few minor tweaks. One area that was new to us that worked out quite well was a cliff line on Camp Pinnacle property. It's about a 1.5 mile drive from the camp (and vehicles with high clearance are recommended). This cliff gives multiple training opportunities and allows for multiple classes to be widely spread out. Area is shaded and the cliff heights range from 10' to over 50'. Some clearing may be necessary. There is also lots of parking here. Part of what prompted the success of this particular training was a huge interest (8 of the original 14 students) from the local medical school's outdoor program. While many had never been on rope before or caving, they picked up the skills quickly and rocked. The president of the outdoor program was able to find full funding for all her students. I look forward to further training with them.

Webinars

I was asked initially by the Bald Eagle Grotto to give a quick webinar for their grotto meeting. The topic "Welcome to your First Rescue"

This was followed up by requests from the Windy City Grotto and finally the San Joaquin Valley Grotto. Still available for other grottos upon request.

Also did the Northeastern Webinar for the new set of NSS videos Gretchen and Sarah are doing.

Recent Rescues / Events

- May 19, 2020 A fisherman loses his footing and is swept into Boulder River natural bridge, a cave/karst feature. RMR was contacted by Gallatin NF for assistance. Diving coordinator Zeb Lilly and I offered advice and assistance to the AHJ. No dive was attempted. The body was discovered by a "spelunker" below the falls on September 11, 2020.
- October 17, 2020 Nielsons Cave, Utah A caver used a rope in a bag for a 300 foot pit. He was assured by another caver that this rope had been used on the pit previously. About 40 feet off the ground the caver felt the end of the rope go through his hand. He fell 40 feet, bouncing off of several ledges. The caver amazingly only had minor injuries and the group was able to evacuate on their own.

Regional Training

- Alpine OCR led by Eddy Cartaya at Fossil Mtn. Ice Cave, WY
- Rescue Pre-Plan workshop -three Zoom sessions in January with a caving project in the region. Led by Bonny Armstrong. First session Intro to pre-plan, review of SPAR systems, homework assignment. Second session participants present their solutions for complex vertical problem Third session Bonny and I summarized the solutions, pointing out things in common and important distinctions. Provided recommendations.

2021 National Site Coordinator Report

Overview

I had hoped this would be a review of a successful 2020 National Seminar and I'd be reporting on closing things up. Obviously that is not the case. Due to the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic, the decision was made last year to postpone the 2020 National in New York to 2021 using the same site and facilities, hoping the pandemic would be over.

Unfortunately, that is not the case. The pandemic continues to loom large in our planning. At this time, I do not feel we can have a successful National Seminar for the current June 11-19th dates. While vaccination rates continue to improve, it does not appear we would be able to attract enough students across all levels to have an effective seminar.

Therefore: It is my recommendation, with the approval of the Training Coordinator to do the following:

The current June 11-19th dates be turned into a Regional Level 1 seminar. It appears under the current (and expected by then) NYS travel rules, we would be able to do this in a safe and effective manner. The smaller size of a regional, and the limited number of people involved would reduce the risks from Covid greatly. This regional would be limited to 14-20 students (unless things dramatically change for the better).

Move the National to a date in late August or early September. At this time the week of Sept 3rd-11th is being proposed. Despite this being Labor Day weekend and OTR occurring the first weekend, an ongoing Survey Monkey survey suggests that we would have sufficient interest from students and availability of instructors to make this work. The only other week the camp is currently available at this time is August 28th-Sept 4th which is also a very popular date among the students.

There are more details below.

Camp

The new retreat coordinator that was hired last year as since left, but we continue to have good communications with the camp.

They are very willing to work with us as needed.

Caves

Working on cave access. The Northeastern Cave Conservancy (NCC) is very eager to work with us and we expect to have more than enough caves and preserves for everyone. These include:

- Clarksville Cave Closest, heavily usable for Level 1
- Knox Cave usable by all levels
- Ella Armstrong very small, limited, tight vertical entrance

- Sellecks I believe used for up/down in the past
- Bensons Acquired since last seminar, not familiar with it
- Alan Traino Preserve Not on current webpage, but about 20 minutes away, useful for up/down

Also we have access to NSS preserves:

- McFails (useful for up/down) (cave itself is wetsuit only)
- James Gage (vertical entrance, but used for Level 2 in the past)
- Schoharie (single long, water filled passage)

Cliffs

We continue to have preliminary permission to use a set of cliffs at Thacher Park (not the main ones) that if work out is a 10 minute drive and 1 minute walk.

However, our Regional Modular Level 1 class allowed us to explore and make use of a line of cliffs ON Camp property. This line of cliffs is over .5 miles long and gives a great variety of work areas with plenty of room for parking. This is about a 10 minute drive from the Camp parking lot. Vehicles with high ground clearance are recommended (though at least one Prius has made it in.)

And if needed we can have access to cliffs in Schoharie itself that we've used in the past. This is about 30 minutes away.

Signups

At this time, 50 students (including IQ) have signed up. Current breakeven is 55 (based on 30 instructors attending) (this includes slight price increase for 2021 registrants)

- Level 1-31 (cap is at 31, we have 6 additional already on the waitlist for a total of 37)
- Level 2-3 (This is some concern, but we expect a boost after the Regional)
- Level 3 -5 Cap is set at 16
- TOFE 6 Cap is currently set at 16. May increase depending on interest
- IQ 5 all 5 had registered for last year

At this time I have done NO marketing for 2021 in light of the on-going pandemic. After this weekend, after I've received board guidance, I expect to make a large marketing push so I expect all numbers to go up. I expect some changes to the numbers if we change the date, but as it is, we cannot guarantee the folks currently signed up can attend in June in any event. A later date however gives everyone a greater chance to be vaccinated which allows a much higher likelihood folks can attend (and NYS rules allow attendance).

I will note we've had 6 signups for Level 1 in the past 3 weeks despite no effective marketing and folks being aware that the event may be cancelled or postponed.

I believe by if we postpone to September, with a marketing blitz we can get a sufficient number of students for all levels beyond Level 1.

Conclusion

While Covid looms large over our planning, I feel confident we can have an effective National Seminar if we postpone to September and resume marketing in the near future. That said, it is

still entirely possible that we will need to cancel the National if vaccination rates fall short of current projects or other factors come into play.

Subject: 2021 Report on NCRC Scholarship Program

This document is the 2021 annual report to the BORC on NCRC's Scholarship program. The funds are in an endowment fund managed by the NSS. At the beginning of each fiscal year for the NSS, April 1st, the amount of money available for NCRC scholarships will be determined. This amount will vary from year to year based on market conditions and to ensure the principal of the fund is not touched.

Scholarships awarded

For the 2020-2021 NSS Fiscal year, \$6,000 has been available for the NCRC Scholarship fund. Per the 2020 NCRC Scholarships BORC Report, half of the funds were allocated to the National training and half of the funds were available for Regional week-longs.

Due to the covid pandemic, the national training did not occur in 2020. Per a decision by the BORC, the scholarships awarded will be valid for the next National training, currently planned in New York for June 2021.

Only one regional training requested scholarships, a SPAR class in Oregon in August 2020. The scholarship committee unanimously agreed to put aside money for scholarships; however, no completed applications were received. Three partial applications were submitted by international students who did not attend the training due to the pandemic.

It is anticipated that more scholarships will be awarded in future years once the pandemic is over.

Scholarship plans for NSS 2021-2022 Fiscal Year

For the upcoming fiscal year, unless the BORC provides guidance otherwise, I recommend that 50% of the funds be allocated to scholarships for the National training in New York and 50% of the funds be reserved for Regional week-long trainings. Per the BORC guidance, voting members of the NCRC Scholarship committee will determine the specific amount of funds to be available for each Regional training requesting scholarships.

For the upcoming National training in New York, provided the training is a go given the pandemic, scholarship applications will be due by March 31st and the scholarship awardees will be determined and announced by mid April. Advertising for National scholarships will begin after the Feb 27th BORC meeting.

Scholarships for Regional week-longs are available upon request. See attachment A for the request format. Please send the request as far in advance as possible to ensure there is enough time for the Scholarship committee to review the availability of funds, to provide sufficient time for students to apply, and to allow the Scholarship committee time to review the applications.

Please note: I will be unresponsive to email mid-Aug thru mid-Sept, thus if you have Regional training in the second half of 2021 and you would like to request scholarships for the training,

please submit your request before August 15th.

BORC Guidance Requested

As we have worked through the revised guidance established by the BORC in 2019, a handful of areas for clarification have risen. I request that the BORC review the following recommendations for enhancements to the NCRC scholarship guidance and vote on the changes during the Feb 27th, 2021 BORC meeting.

- 1 Add a rule to not allow instructors to apply for scholarships (for example, an instructor attending a SPARX class for lead certification).
- 2 Currently I am under the understanding that three letters of recommendation are required for National training. This amount seems a bit excessive and it is not clear if the same requirement should be held for Regional week-longs. I recommend that the guidance be revised to state that a minimum of two letters of recommendation is required for all applications. This should apply to both National and Regional events.
- 3 Per previous guidance for scoring applications, it was noted that NSS membership is required and the longer the applicant is an NSS member, the better. As many of our applicants are fairly new to the NSS, I recommend that no weight be given regarding the length of NSS membership.
- 4 Additionally regarding NSS membership, for National training, NSS membership is required. However, this is not the case for Regional training. To encourage more NSS membership and to not discourage those who are not yet NSS members from applying for a scholarship, I recommend that the scholarship guidance be revised to state if an applicant is awarded a scholarship and is not an NSS member, a portion of their scholarship money will be applied toward their NSS membership.
